Twenty years ago, Benny started playing the piano in the back of his folks' laundry in Los Angeles. His strong classical background added new dimensions to a rock group he started as a teenager.

While pursuing a degree in Psychology at Cal State Long Beach, he performed with *Hiroshima*, one of the first Asian-American jazz-rock groups, where he played keyboards and composed material for the next five years. Versatility in Asian musical forms in addition to years of experience with jazz and rock has contributed to the lyrical yet dramatic quality of his playing and writing.

His feeling for the community has added depth to his work and has motivated him to lead community workshops and concerts. For the past two years he has been writing and performing with Nobuko, touring the country doing college concerts. Their mutual concerns have resulted in a special musical relationship which shows in the songs they have written.
