Edited by Virginia Naeve (Swallow, Denver: 1964) -- This full length book is a compilation of letters, documents, writings, studies and poems concerning the scientific, sociological, medical, spiritual and psychological effects of the bombings. It contains full and fascinating reports on the 1962 Hiroshima Peace Pilgrimage, on the Rome-Geneva Peace Pilgrimage, the Hiroshima Maidens and the Japanese Peace Movement. An invaluable compendium for all who are concerned about the bombings and their significance.

Actual Facts of the A-Bomb Disaster -- a booklet covering the physical effects of the atomic bomb, written, researched and compiled by Dr. Naomi Shohno, nuclear physicist and delegate of the World Peace Study Mission; plus a section on the "Atomic Bomb Injury and Effects" by Drs. Yukio Fujimoto and Fukashi Nakamura, physicians and delegates of the Mission. The information presented in this booklet represents the accumulated knowledge of the effect of the bomb by men working directly in the living laboratories of Hiroshima and Nagasaki. There are no comparable reports in terms of first hand knowledge and closeness to the subject matter. (A third section on the feelings and living conditions of the survivors, by Hiromu Morishita and Ryuji Hamai, poet and writer respectively, and delegates of the World Peace Study Mission, is now being translated and will be available shortly.)

1. Children of the Ashes. (B.B.C., 16 mm., 34 min.) Written and directed by Robert Jungk.

An objective, powerful and sobering documentary on Hiroshima today. The Atomic bomb effects on a boom-town of bars, tourists and war materiels industry, where the survivors live in a ghetto of discrimination. An impressive and highly important film.

2. A Thousand Cranes. (Produced by the Women's International League for Peace and Freedom). Written and directed by Betty Jean Lifton. The beautiful, touching and inspiring story of Sadako Sasai, a little leukemia victim of the bomb who tried to fold a thousand paper cranes - the traditional symbol of longevity; and of the Folded Crane Clubs founded by Ichiro and Tokie Kawamoto -- the children's club of Hiroshima which helps the survivors and works for peace.

3. Hiroshima Peace Pilgrimage. (20 min.) - An inspirational documentary of the 1962 journey of two young survivors, Miyoko Matsubara and Hiromasa Hanabusa (both delegates of the current World Peace Study Mission) from Hiroshima to Geneva, to appeal to the governments of the world for a ban on nuclear testing.
