INDIGENOUS URANIUM FORUM

Being Held at

First Global Radiation Victims Conference

The First Global Radiation Victims Conference will be held September 26, 1987 through October 3, 1987 at The Roosevelt Hotel, Madison Avenue at 46th Street in Manhattan. In addition, there will be related events held at various locations throughout New York City (see schedule below). Areas covered in the Conference will include special sessions for scientists and doctors exchanging papers on ionizing radiation health effects, attorneys exchanging information on compensation for radiation victims, photographers and filmmakers sharing information on their work, and radiation victims meeting with each other. Radiation victims will present their stories to the media, and a session of delegates will adopt formal conference resolutions. Japanese radiation victims who are survivors of the bombings of Hiroshima and Nagasaki are known as "HIBAKUSHA" in Japan and the Conference will highlight the less known "Hidden Hibakusha" of the nuclear arms race and the nuclear chain.

Prominent amongst these "Hidden Victims" are Native Peoples from various parts of the world, including North and South America, Australia, the Pacific, and the Sami of Northern Scandinavia. These Indigenous Nations are in such a precarious status that the impact of this contamination, whether due to uranium mining, bomb testing, etc., constitutes genocide: the total destruction of a Culture.
