

## ADIO ADDRESSA

wish to direct my remarks this afternoon to those in the radio audience who are becoming weary of industrial strife, high prices, housing shortages, juvenile delinquency, and lack of I make no job opportunities. effort to minimize these prob-lems. But I would like to inject a simple thought into your thinking, with the hope that you and I can assume a healthier approach toward our post-war difficulties.

Let me begin with a simple I am thinking today of a young Japanese-American boy whom first knew some years ago on the island of Hawaii. We'll call Like thousands of him Masa. other young men in the territory, Masa obtained a job upon graduation from high school. He worked hard, planning for the future.

When Pearl Harbor was attacked, Masa's foremost thought was the defense of his home, his Hawaii, his America. But it was not un-til March, 1943, that he was able to enlist. Masa then became one of the 2,600 eager volunteers who were to achieve a brilliant record in battle as members of the 442nd Regimental

Combat Team.

Following a year of strenuous training at Camp Shelby, Missis-Masa was shipped overseas sippi, as a replacement for the 100th He was as-Infantry Battalion. signed to a rifle company, and after three months as a rifleman, he was dead. I do not know whether he was cited for gallantry or heroism. I do not even know how he was killed. But I do know that he is dead, by enemy fire, that he is buried somewhere in Italy, that he is a hero in his own right.


More tragic than Masa's death is the fact that about a thousand others of Hawaii's finest manhood shared his fate--young men who would be glad to be alive today, enjoying all that life offers. These men, together with thousands of other American youths, paid a very dear price to keep the hor-ror and brutality of war away from American shores. We veterans who were fortunate enough to return can never forget what it meant to pay that price. We would like to share the pain of this memory with others. Bethen, and only then, can cause, we truly appreciate the sacrifices made to make America what it is today. Only then can we become tolerant of opposing Only then can we viewpoints. tackle our post-war tasks with determination and purpose. Only then can we forget our bitterness, our disappointments, and our prejudices. Only then can we say, "It's good to be alive!"
Our Nation is 171 years old

today. From the Battle of Bunker Hill to the Battle of Okinawa, the pages of history are full of American courage, patience, and Let us use these same qualities of good, solid Americanism to meet the challenges of

our post-war period.

A large crowd of enthusiastic spectators gathered at the Fort Shafter Palm Circle Field on July 31 to witness the re-activation proceedings of the 442nd Infantry Regiment. The 100th Battalion has been re-activated as the first battalion of the outfit.

Lt. Col. Harry G. Albright assumed command of the "Go For Broke" unit. Major Henry Kawano has been named as the regimental executive officer. Major Mitsuyoshi Fukuda once again heads the "Puka Puka" Battalion as the commanding officer with Captain Allan Ohata as the Battalion exec.

Staff officers of the re-activated 100th Battalion are 1st Lt. Takeichi Miyashiro, 1st Lt. Dick N. Hirano, 2nd Lt. Toshimi

Sodetani, and 1st Lt. Conrad Tsukayama.

The colors of the 442nd Infantry Regiment and the 100th Battalion which were entrusted to the Territory of Hawaii on August 15, 1946, were turned over by Governor Stainback to Lt. General John E. Hull. The General in turn presented them to the commanding officers of the two organizations.

Color bearers from the Club 100 who participated in the ceremony were: Master Sergeant Toshio Kunimura, 1st Sergeant Warren Iwai, 1st Sergeant Masayoshi Kawamoto, and Tech. Ser-

High single game honor went to Wilfred Shobu who boasted




