All those interested are asked to contact any of the above-named people.

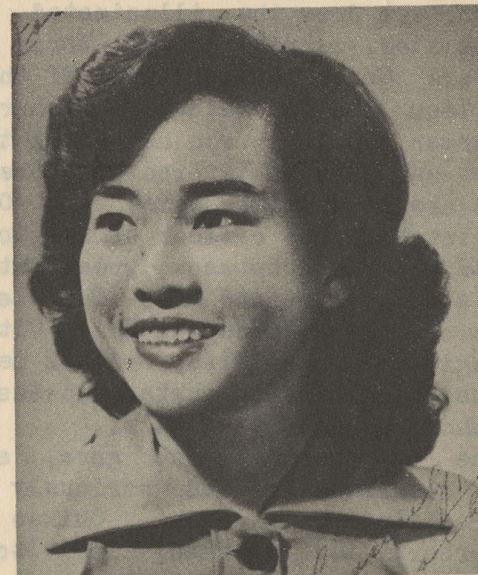
YAF AND 442 INVITE GI'S AND NSO

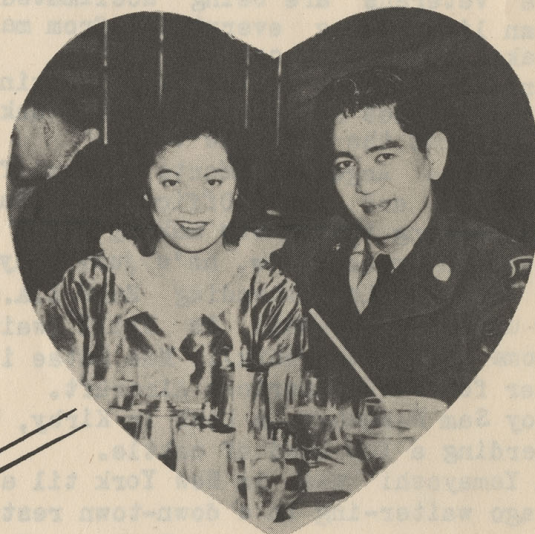
