The second fracas happened several weeks later at a New Year's dance sponsored by a veteran's association. An evening planned for fun and gaiety was quickly marred by a series of fights.

Of more recent date, the third low blow was struck at a social arranged by the same association above. Here again, a minority element turned a pleasant evening into a fiasco.

The last brawl brought serious consequences. Ironically, the sponsoring group, which had been the only organization to heartily back up and consistently support the N.S.O. from the start, is now banned to hold further socials at the clubhouse in which the veterans had met every month for the past three years. What's more, the associations clean record had been blemished for the first time since its founding.

Fortunately, none of the above affairs directly involved the N.S.O. Unfortunately, however, all the frays involved servicemen. Thus, the Nisei Service Organization feels and shares some measure of responsibility.

Rowdyism of this sort must be halted. The time is now. Too great a reflection has already been cast. This is depressing because the N.S.O., including friends in civilian and G.I. ranks, have been working and striving hard to build up a solid program and well respected organization in behalf of the servicemen.
