The new president chaired the temporary 442nd Committee which was instrumental in organizing the Association. He was a member of Company K.

His wife, nee Mary Nakahara, was a leader of the Aloha USO in Hattiesburg, Miss., and the teen-age Crusaders club of Jerome, Ark.

"Go For Broke" Reunion Lunch Is Scene of Birth

At a mass luncheon-business meeting in the Miyako Restaurant during the "Go For Broke" Reunion in May, the local 442nd Association was born.

Temporary officers were elected to carry out the formation of the club and given carte blanche powers to organize.

In September the first officers and board of governors were installed.

Prior to the MGM "era" of "Go For Broke," the idea of a 442nd organization in New York City was seriously discussed by local veterans.

Nothing definite happened until the 442nd Committee was formed to handle details of the reunion. At the business meeting, committee members spoke out for a permanent organization.

Their plan got unanimous approval.

The problem of a meeting place was solved when arrangements were made with the 77th Division veterans to use their headquarters at 28 East 39th St., in Manhattan. This central location is complete with cocktail lounge, dining room, library, recreation room and other facilities.

The American flag which is displayed at all meetings of the Association, and on special occasions such as the Nisei Memorial Service, has a story of heartbreak and honor behind it.

It was one of the flags presented by the Belgian government to families of American soldiers buried in Belgium's cemeteries.

This flag was given to Miss Flora Fifield (who has taken her maiden name) in honor of the memory of her husband, Rupert White. A member of the 92nd Chemical Warfare Service, he was killed in action at Aldenhoven, near the Roer River.


Miss Fifield, knowing of the 442nd's record, presented the colors to the Association through her friend, Kelly Kuwayama. Kelly was best man at their wedding.

It was displayed in the lobby of the Capitol Theater during the first run of the picture, "Go For Broke," in New York City.


The banner was given to the Association at the end of the Capital showing.
