(Conclusion of talk made at the Nisei Veterans Reunion in Hawaii on July 1, 1973, by Gen. Fred C. Weyand, Pacific Army Commander.)

Many who have analyzed modern attitudes of Americans have concluded that patriotism has gone out of style. You and I know that this would be tragic if true, because no nation can survive if it does not have the lasting devotion and allegiance of its people.

President Calvin Coolidge once said: 'Patriotism is easy to understand in America. It means looking out for your country.' Americans of Japanese ancestry never have had any difficulty in understanding that definition and your example is the best reassurance our nation could have that patriotism is still our great strength.

As we conduct these Nisei Veterans Memorial Rites at the National Cemetery of the Pacific, I look to the National colors which are the symbol of our country. As we honor the flag we honor the United States of America and the precious freedoms that are its foundation.

We saw patriotism displayed with deep emotion by our former prisoners when they returned from Vietnam as they told of the faith in their flag and country that sustained them through years of torture and deprivation.

#### THE 93RD CONGRESS RESPONDS TO VETERANS' NEEDS SAYS MATSUNAGA

Honolulu — The 93rd Congress will probably go down in history as "The Veterans Congress," Rep. Spark Matsunaga (D-Hawaii) told members of the American Legion recently.

The Hawaii lawmaker, a veteran of the famous 100th Infantry Battalion, which later became the First Battalion of the 442nd Regimental Combat Team of World War II fame, addressed a joint meeting of the Legion's Committees on Rules, Legislation, and Internal Affairs. In his prepared remarks, he pointed out that two major new laws affecting veterans have already been enacted this year, and that many less sweeping measures are pending in the House and Sen-

The National Cemeteries Act, signed into law in June of this year after President Nixon had "pocket vetoed" a

similar measure passed by the 92nd Congress last year, will make possible the maximum use of limited space in national cemeteries, including Hawaii's own National Cemetery of the Pacific. Matsunaga said. The new law creates a National Cemetery System, administered by the Veterans Administration (VA), which combines the cemeteries operated by the Department of the Army. Under the provisions of the new law. the VA is directed to recommend a new national burial policy.

The National Cemeteries Act also authorizes a special \$150 burial allowance for veterans who are not buried in national cemeteries, in addition to the existing \$250 allowance for veterans' burial and funeral expenses, Matsunaga said.

Congress also acted to improve and strengthen the veterans health care system, Matsunaga told the Legionnaires. The "Veterans Health Care Expansion Act of 1973," enacted earlier this year, directs the VA Administrator to maintain enough beds in VA hospitals to insure the immediate acceptance of every eligible veteran who applies for care, and authorizes outpatient care

# SPARKY COMMENDED BY PUBLIC BROADCASTING SERVICE

Washington, D.C. -- Rep. Spark Matsunaga (D-Hawaii) has been commended by the Public Broadcasting Service (PES) for his strong support of legislation to strengthen and improve the Corporation for Public Broadcasting.

In a letter to the Hawaii lawmaker, Ralph B. Rogers, Chairman of the PES Board of Governors, said:

"On behalf of the Board of Governors of the Public Broadcasting Service, and the chairmen of public television stations throughout the nation, allow me to thank you for the excellent remarks you presented in behalf of the Public Broadcasting Act in the recent House debate.

"Your reference to KHET's programs on child care was especially thoughtful."

In his speech, Matsunaga had urged his colleagues to support increased funding for a stronger, more effective public broadcasting system. Increased public funding

Jim Yoshida described it vividly when in 1945 he saw the American flag for the first time in several years. He said, 'I gulped. I couldn't take my eyes off the flag. Such a beautiful sight it was. My skin tingled....' He spoke to the flag, saying, 'I want to salute you, but I don't know how the American soldier salutes. I never had a chance.'

That was the emotional response of a Japanese-American who had seen both sides. And it was the essence of the patriotism of the Japanese-American servicemen who fought

for their country and whom we honor in these ceremonies. It is a lesson in patriotism which generals and civilians of other ethnic origins should learn well.

And now I ask that you join me in a brief prayer:
'Dear God, thank you for having given us men such as these we honor today. Amen.'"
