Mr. George C. Wallace, Division Engineer of the City & County Sewer Department sent a check for \$25, and assured the club that he will contribute one day's pay each year just as long as he can keep on working. Mr. Wallace also contri-

buted \$25 last year.

Mr. Gilbert D. Kobatake, former
Captain of the 232nd Engineer Company of the 442nd Combat Team, donated \$50 to the scholarship fund. He is now in his own business as a general contractor and one of the stanchest boosters of the club.

#### **Directors in Lively Session**

Spirited discussion over many con-troversial matters highlighted the board of directors meeting held on Friday, March 2. Many of the issues were so pointed that tempers ran high quite frequently and for the first time in many, many months the meeting prolonged on through the wee hours of early Saturday morn-

The site of the annual banquet was the source of much frustration to the board and called for lightning footwork and some fast thinking on the part of John Tsukano, chairman of the social committee. After much phone calling and unbearable waiting, the board selected Waikiki Lau Yee Chai as the banquet quarters on Saturday, April 7. Tsukano also announced that the affair will be semi-formal, and that members may bring as many paid guests as preferred.

After much elaboration and discussion on Dan Konno's finance committee report, the matter of the secretary's salary was referred back to the chapters for thorough goingover and final disposition at the next board meeting.

Request to permit any and all volunteers of our organization to participate in the 1951 Red Cross Drive as volunteers of 442nd was granted after an eloquent speech by Daniel Aoki. His board of governors report on rental policies was directed to the membership for additions or deletions.

## ONE MAN ART SHOW

Lawai, Kauai born Bunpei Akaji scratched his whiskers and said, "When the day came for me to say goodbye to Italy, I went to see my professor and his parting words were: 'Your land of Hawaii is a land of beauty. May you use what you have learned and seen here to make that land one of even greater beauty."

Home after six years, most of them in Italy, Bunpei Akaji aim to do just that-make Hawaii even more beautiful with the use of Italian art.
The man who prefers Italian food

as prepared in Italy to local dishes, was inducted in 1944 and took basic training in Camp Fannin, Texas. He joined the 442nd just after the allies had driven the Germans out of the Italian area. He took his discharge in Leghorn in 1947 and attended the Acadamia de Belle Arti in Florence for a few months. Then he attended the academy of fine arts in Milano, under the G.I. bill of rights, completing the four year academic course in 2 years.

In 1949 and 1950 he received the Fulbright scholarship for advance and research studies. His sojourn in Italy took him from the boot all the way up to Germany. "I learned the language real well and even got to understand the people and their way of living," he said seriously.

Bunpei returned to Honolulu December 1, and is now living at 2512 Kapiolani Blvd. with his sister.

He hoped to have a one man art show when he returned but found the Honolulu academy of arts and Library of Hawaii auditorium booked for months ahead.

The 442nd Veterans Club heard of his predicament, and in the last board of directors meeting, unanimously voted to sponsor his show.

The one man art show featuring his paintings, sculpture and mosaic will be held at 933 Wiliwili Street, beginning March 26 to April 7. Refreshments will be served at the opening night, March 26, starting from 7:00 p.m. The public is cordially invited to attend.

## SIX YEARS AGO-March, 1945

The 1st French Motorized Infantry Division took over the Combat Team's sector in Southern France. The 522nd Field Artillery was ordered north to join the Sev-enth Army. Col. C. W. Pence, still suffering from the injury received in the Vosges Mountains was re-placed by his executive, Col. Virgil R. Miller. March 20, 21, 22, the outfit boarded LST's and headed back to Italia.

## VETERANS' BENEFIT

The attention of all vets are called to the fact that their education and training benefits will expire on July 25, 1951. Any educational courses you want to take up must be initiated prior to July 25 of this year. Don't wait until the last minute to use your educational benefits.

If circumstances does not permit your being a full-time student, take up some correspondence school courses. For further information, call Veterans Administration at 50571 or call Secretary Fujiki at Club headquarters. Phone 93997.

Some of the features of the many

provisions are:
Period of Education.—One year
plus your length of service but not exceeding 4 years.

Tuition Payments.—Cannot exceed \$500 for an ordinary school year, but arrangements can be made through V.A. for courses costing in excess of this amount.

Subsistence Payments. - Apprentice or on the job trainees receive \$65 per month if without dependents, and \$90 per month if with dependents.

Full-time students receive \$75 per month if without dependents, \$105 per month with one dependent, and \$120 per month if you have more than one dependent.
