Weekdays, don't even bother to get tee times. Just go and tee off since there's hardly anybody on the course. During Summers when the day breaks early, and the days are long and hot, it is common to tee off shortly after 0600 and finish about 1030. That is..if there aren't any STAN YAMAMOTO's Rubber-Shoe Gang in front hacking away or looking for lost balls. Going home around 1630 makes the 19th hole longer than the 18 holes. Just about all the members will be through golfing by noon and so the local Nationals drive over in droves despite the \$35.00 green fee. They tip the caddies good too so in the morning when the menbers play, the caddies go into hiding and comes out when the Nationals play. Oh well...who needs caddies anyway. They're not young and pretty as depicted in the movies. Our foursome, we rent a gas cart, lash four golf bags to it and the four of us take turns riding the cart. They joined the 442 as replacements in Feb. 1945 in France. Yosh with his education ended up in the Medics. After discharge he earned his B.A. & M.S. at Denver University. Worked in the V.A. Hospital since 1952 to retirement in 1975 as a research chemist and as a part of an organ transplant team. He also served as Commander of the Cathay American Legion Post in Denver, CO. in 1963 and again in 1975. Denver is also the home for another 522 FA Medic Sam Tsuchiya.. and many 442 vets remember enjoying Denver's hospitality on their Centennial, prior to the NVR in Chicago, and the Bicentennial



A student from Kailua High School called me.. she asked whether I would be able to tell about the 442nd Combat Team.

In my speech I said, "United States is a wonderful country. We have right and justice. Other countries do not have certain rights."

We volunteered and my dad said, "This is your country. Fight well!" He came from Japan. I told them that I was seasick on the Pacific and Atlantic.

We worked hard at camp. In the big cities, we had to close the blinds because they knew we were Japanese, but we were Americans. We had night activities as well as daytime activities.

In Naples, people were starving. We were to cover the food left over, but the Italians said, do not cover it. When we left, they jumped over the fence and got the food. We left Rome and went farther north. We started to fight... and in one case, we heard the artillery coming. We jumped in the foxholes...one landed six feet from me. I heard the ringing in my ears.

Later we pulled back to Rome. We were planning to invade Southern France on August 15, 1944. The paratroopers needed the help of the Anti-Tank guns, just in case the tanks came. We flew twice in the gliders; but we tied double ropes...none of the glider pilots were killed. There were others who died, but not the Anti-Tank group. The paratroopers removed some of the bombs. Three sets of gliders were coming...we had to go around once, and land. It was a terraced area. We landed...but our glider hit the terrace and we were up front...the tail of the glider was up... but we worked it and were able to meet the group. After that we split to protect the paratroopers.

We were in a house that the Germans had occupied. We didn't touch anything; but later the paratroopers came through and blasted the safe. They found American money and the group picked up the American money.

We were told not to go into Italy. So we stopped; and we had a ball! People were able to go to Nice and enjoy thenselves. I went there several times. But we did capture some Germans on the high hills.

Later, we found out that the 442nd Combat Team went up to Bruyeres. We were able to save the lost battalion from Texas. At that time the trees were down, but when we visited Bruyeres two summers ago...the French people did not want us to stay at the hotel...they insisted that we stay at their homes. There are two memorials for the 442nd Combat Team...when we first started to fight and there is a memorial...when anyone passes there they bring flowers!

At one point we were told to contact the next troop. This was close to winter and sometimes the cloud cover the sky...we couldn't see the trees or anyone. But the night that I was supposed to go, it was a beautiful night and we were able to contact the next troop. After that we left for Nice.

Later we went back to Italy. We climbed a steep hill for eight hours...and the troops spread out. The Germans were surprised. They asked, are we Japanese...we said 'yes', but we are Americans!

Later, we were in Turin...the Germans walked on one side of the river and the Americans walked on the other side of the river. We did not shoot each other... the war will be over in

We visited Italy...different cities. Later, we came back to the U. S. and back to Hawaii.

There was a party for HALO and KIYOMI HIROSE at the SAKAI'S residence. They left for Japan. Those who came were: KO & JANET HATA, JACK & MARGARET KAGUNI, YUKIO & NORA NAKAHIRA, ADOLPH NAKAMURA, KENNETH & HELEN YOKOYAMA, LIN-COLN & RUTH YOSHIMASU, TOSHIO MORIYAMA, ISAO OSHIBA, EDDY & MARY SAKAI. The rest who didn't come , expressed their regrets...they had something else to do. Carnation leis were given to HALO and KIYOMI by TOSHIO MORIYAMA. #### FRIENDS FROM FRANCE------by Walter Matsumoto

A French couple, Monsieur and Madame Jose (Hilda) De Muenynck of Beausoleil (next to Monte

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Carlo) were given a taste of Hawaiian Hospitality by Gilbert and Kay Kobatake and Walter and Hazel Matsumoto when they visited Hawaii recently, for the first time. The friendship with the French friends began in December, 1944, in the little mountain town of Sclos de Contes in southern France. The Company had just moved into the town with the HQ and lst. Platoons billeted in various pensions and unoccupied buildings scattered around the town. The 2nd Platoon was in Sospel and the 3rd, in Menton.

As it usually happens, in a foreign country, the language barrier was the contributing factor in this long friendship. It seemed that some of our men had struck up a conversation with the Padre of the town's church, but were getting nowhere, as neither side understood the other. The Padre, knowing that Madame De Muenynck, who spoke fluent English, was in the town at the time, scrounging for food, such as eggs, vegetables, poultry, etc. from the farmers, to take home to her family in Beausoleil, and requested her assistance. The writer, who was 1st. Platoon leader and acting Company C.O. at the time, (Captain Nakada was in the hospital for a minor surgery) was called to join in the confab. The subject matter escapes the memory, but it was casual and not on any problem. Having been educated in England, when she was a girl, Madame De Muenynck acted as our very capable interpreter. In appreciation for her help, I invited her and her friend, Madame Louveau, to have breakfast the next morning in our mess hall, adjoining the village bar. Needless to say, they enjoyed the fare of cereal, bacon and eggs, coffee, etc. To them it was a real treat.

She also acted as our interpreter with Madame Kaspard, the owner of the pension, in which we were billeted. McMm Kaspard, a retired nurse, was not too surprised to us, as she remembered treating some AJA's from Hawaii in WMI.

The Beausoleil-Monte Carlo area is at the foot of a mountainous terrain. Consequently, there are no farms or grazing land. Nearly all of the food must be brought in, so this is a constant problem, and more so in time of war. Yet in spite of this shortage, the De Muenyncks invited some of us (Barney, Punjab, Tatsukawa, Morimoto and me) to their home for Christmas dinner. To supplement their fare, we brought along our rations to share with them. After dinner, we sang Xmas carols, with Punjab doing the solos. Understandably, there was nothing fancy about the whole affair, but one we'll always remember. The thought of their sincere kindness to invite some American soldiers, who were total strangers until a short time ago, into their home at Xmas time, was indeed heartwarming.

When Gilbert returned to the Company, after several months in a hospital in Dijon, for S-mine wounds received in the Vosges, he, Francis Fujita and I visited the De Muenyncks, they for the first time.

In March, 1948, after over four months in this part of France, the Combat Team was ordered to prepare for movement to Italy. Before we left we paid a last visit with our French friends and bid au revoir. We left with them and Madame Kaspard boxes of accumulated articles like soap, chewing gum, candies, etc. We parted with the hope that we could meet again someday, after the war, under more pleasant circumstances. For Gilbert, this wasn't the last, as he was able to see them again shortly after the war. He had crossed the Italian-French border, ostensibly to look for construction and repair work for the Company. And, by "coincidence," he wound up at the De Muenynck home.

Our friendship continued over the years and kept alive by the never-failing Xmas cards and occasional letter or two each year.

In November, 1974, the 442nd Veterans Club traveled to Europe, the highlight being to join the people of Bruyeres to celebrate the 30th Anniversary of the liberation of the town from the enemy by the 442nd. Since the itinerary included a two-day stop at Nice, we wrote them in advance the date and hotel of our Nice stay. Beausoleil is a half-hour ride, East of Italy side of Nice.

On the morning after our first night in Nice, we were pleasantly surprised to see Madame De Muenynck waiting to meet us outside the hotel. Naturally, the intervening 30 years had brought changes in our appearance, and we had to look questioningly a few moments, before we were sure of recognizing each other. We exchanged greetings, befitting a 30-year separation. She then took us (Hazel and me and Gilbert and Kay) for a leisurely ride to their home, where husband Jose awaited us. Lunch was served, after which we spent a relaxing afternoon, reacquainting ourselves reminiscing the old days and bringing things up to date.

The next morning, Hilda and Jose picked us (less Kay) up at the hotel in their compact car for a whole day, sight-seeing and re-visiting old familiar places. Our first stop was at Sclos, where it all began. The pension, we stayed in, had been enlarged with an addition. The Cathedral, the HQs and kitchen buildings and road through the village, remained nearly the same. After a softdrink treat by the new owner of the pension, we

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continued up the winding road through Lescarene and on up the multi U-turns to Col de Braus, at the high point. Here, at a makeshift roadside restaurant, we enjoyed an unusual lunch, the entree being a choice of rabbit or bird, both native to the area.

We continued down the winding road to Sospel. And as we rode downward, we were reminded of the constant shelling by the enemy on exposed sections of the roadway. The town looked the same as we saw it 30 years ago. The school building, which we occupied, and which was the target of countless shellings, now stood in serene quiet. From Sospel, we headed south via Castillon to Monte Carlo, where we said good-bye to our friends and rejoined our tour group in the Casino. Thus ended our short Reunion, which we hoped would not be the last.

The following years went by and we settled down to a well-earned retirement. Then in early October, we received a letter from them, which took us by complete surprise. They were in California, and were scheduled to come to Hawaii on October 28 for an 8 -day stay. We couldn't be happier, but sad because we, only a couple of weeks earlier, had committed ourselves to a trip to Australia and New Zealand. We were in a quandary. After sleeping on the matter overnight, we decided to cancel our proposed trip. Reason? Well, Australia will always be there, and we can go any time later, while our French friends will have traveled 10,000 miles for their first trip to Hawaii, possibly their only one, only to find out that we were far away in the Antipodes. And I've been telling them that they must visit Hawaii someday. As it turned out, we're glad we stayed back.

The De Muenyncks arrived on Wednesday, October 28, 1981. The Kobatakes and we greeted them at the airport, ala Hawaiian style. Needless to say, they were thrilled by their first experience of being laden with leis.

Before checking in at Holiday Inn, we stopped at the La Ronde Restaurant for some refreshment and a view of the City. In the evening, they had their first taste of Japanese cuisine at the Pagoda Floating Restaurant. After dimner, we discussed the schedule for their stay. By this time, of course, they were pretty tired from their long day, and had only one thing in mind---to retire early.

The next day, their first full day in Hawaii was spent sight-seeing--the Civic Center, tour of Iolani Palace and Punchbowl National Cemetery in the morning, and in the afternoon, the tourist's tour of Arizona memorial at Pearl Harbor. Dinner was another new experience---a Hawaiian luau at

the Hale Koa Hotel. As expected, they did not care for the poi and raw fish and opihi, but they enjoyed everything else, and especially the hula show that followed.

A trip around the island with Gilbert took all of the next day. Stops were made along the way at all the familiar scenic spots. The highlight was at the Polynesian Cultural Center at Laie, where they took in the afternoon show, and also toured the village grounds. That evening, the regular Chapter meeting was on at the Clubhouse. They stopped by to be introduced to the members and to renew acquaintance with a few. They were impresed by the fact that we were still organized as a Club, the large turnout, the friendliness and the gay spirit that pervaded among the members.

The next day, Saturday, was a free day. They got up late, spent most of the day shopping for their loved ones back home, and even took a dip at Kuhio Beach. They liked the warm temperature of the water, unlike the cold Mediterranean. Lunch was something special for Jose. He attended a Rotary Club International luncheon meeting, and was introduced, not only as a 45-year member, but also of having traveled the farthest to attend the meeting.

On Sunday, they enjoyed a day-long visit to Hawaii (island). Through Gilbert's arrangement, his brother in Hilo greeted them and took them to Kilauea Volcano and other scenic spots. They returned tired, but glad that they had visited at least one other island.

Because of their advanced ages (150 years between them) and Jose's frail health, they spent the three remaining days relaxing, shopping and swimming. We got together with them in the evenings, usually for dimmer. Another ethnic cuisine they enjoyed was a full course Chinese dimmer at Hon Kung. Since this was their last night, we retreated to our home up Sierra Drive and spent the last couple hours relaxing and reviewing the events of the past week.

After eight eventful days in Paradise, they left on Thursday, November 5, 1981 on the first leg of their long trip home. We gave them the usual Hawaiian send-off, with leis and goodies to take home to remember their visit with us. They were, as the French say, fatigue, but happier that they had realized a trip they dreamed about for a long time. They reached home safe and sound, and like the sailor homefrom the sea, they no doubt are saying, "There's no place like home."

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
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
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
