40 years! To some of us, it probably seems like an eternity, but it's finally happened; a pilgrimage back to the battlegrounds for some 50 L Chapter members and family, culminating in a celebration at Bruyeres. Come with us as we retrace our miles and miles of remembering.

Our busload, tour escorted by Paul and Genny Matsumoto, had a stopover in Los Angeles, where we picked up Los Angeles contingent and met; with L members and relatives. The next morning we're off to London on a 10 hour flight via the polar off to the continent by hovercraft, landing in Calais, France.

Memories begin to sharpen as we drive north to Amsterdam, Holland and pass World War II places like Dunkirk and Antwerp which reminds us that winning the war was truly an Allied effort. Pillboxes, now used by farmers for storage, are permanent reminders of the German attempt to defend Fortress Europe. After a day of sightseeing and the inevitable ride on the canals, let's board our bus for Paris and its attractions: the Eiffel Tower, Arc de Triumph, Notre Dame Cathedral, the Louvre Museum and its Mona Lisa, a night-time Lido show. Be glad you're not driving the Champs Elysses, where painted lanes are nonexistent and everything looks a mess but people get to wherever they're going.

Here's Paul and Genny reminding us it's departure time again, south through the French wine growing districts while we get a crash course in winery from our European tour guide. Be thankful we have a night's rest at Grenoble, France which boasts the distinction of hosting the 1976 Winter Olympics

Okay, enough rest, because we have another long bus ride today, all the way to the Mediterranean and Nice. Ahh, now some memories are coming back. Wally Kawamura and Bill Oshiro prove they're not senile when they show us the building which was the USO 40 years ago, now a luxury hotel, and the then Officers' Quarters. Wally wants us to walk with him along the Promenade and see the famous (infamous?) nude bathers along the beach, only today it's too cold, not like the furlough days 40 years ago.

Going still south, let's take a seldom-used route to climb the mountains where Bill Oshiro was wounded, near Sospel, France. Inching up the torturous way up the mountains, we marvel that the Germans could be dislodged from such

commanding positions. Paul Matsumoto takes the bus mike and relates his experiences as a mule skinner, and his daredevil jeep driving when he tried to help wounded Bill Oshiro down from the heights.

Italy, and more memories, and also a chance to practice some long dormant Italian. Excitedly, Jun Yamamoto remembers the field L Company had its bivouac at Vada. The bus is turned around, he tells us about the awful explosion during the demonstration on mines. Pete Fujino is killed here, and his sister Fudge Tanishita wants to remember him with some flowers. Our guide finally finds the local church, but it's closed. In a touching scene, Fudge lays her flowers on the church steps, our group makes a circle, and I was privileged to give a prayer.

The Armo River, and more remembrances. Bill Oshiro and Wally Kawamura tell about the group that went to retrieve some bodies with Chaplain Yamada, how a temporary truce was observed, and words exchanged with the enemy. By a weird coincidence, Wally later met an Italian worker at a cameo factory who was on the opposite side and remembers the particular happening.

As we pass through Carrara, long famous for its marble, Lawrence Pujii and Francis Ohta relate some of L Company's actions here, and how Paul Matsumoto, Casey Kasadate, and Kaz Mori were hit. That Lawrence, he can sure remember specific details and incidents, here as well as the action at Bruyeres and the O'Conner Task Force.

Remember Monte Cassino? The 100th was involved in that action before the 442nd went overseas, and Monte Cassino was one of the Germans' bastions along the Gustav Line. From up the heights you can easily see that it was a formidable place to attack, and the big Polish cemetery is a grim reminder of others' sacrifices. Busloads of Polish nationals visit this place every day to honor those soldiers who once fought for the Allied cause. How different today!

Of course, since we're in Italy we're obliged to visit Rome with its ancient wonders like the Collosseum and present wonders like St. Peter's and the Sistine Chapel with Michaelangelo's paintings, Pisa and its Leaning Tower, Florence and its statue of David, Venice with its gondola rides. Except some guys like Hapa Fujimoto say that a gondola ride 40 years ago is enough to last a lifetime. We only skirt Naples because our guide says that with its 40% unemployment, the crime rate is horrible.

So now it's time to head north again, through

Innsbruck, Austria to Munich, Germany to Lucerne, Switzerland. Most of our sightseeing is over, and so's our shopping, so it's time for Bruyeres. It's not encouraging to hear that Bruyeres is experiencing its worst winter in 100 years, or that it has rained for weeks on end, but amazingly our good luck weatherwise follows us right to Bruyeres.

Four impressive ceremonies are held to honor us and our fallen commades. The first, the unveiling of a memorial by the mayor and the 400 citizens of the town of Biffontaine in the Vosges Forest in the vicinity of the Lost Battalion, involves speeches by French and American officials and placing of wreaths by many groups. You may have read about the dedicated effort to erect the memorial by the Biffontaine mayor in John Tsukano's article in the Star Bulletin.

We also visit the American Cemetery at Epinal where a few 442nd people are still buried. There's a pilgrimage to the memorial in the Heladraye Forest, a memorial that many veterans have visited before. These involved very simple but moving ceremonies, mostly the placing of wreaths. That Sunday, there's a special church service, then a parade to the town square, and more speech making and wreath placing. After that, we have our farewell luncheon. Oh, the previous night we had hosted an appreciation banquet for the town council and other dignitaries.

Some memories have dimmed, even Lawrence's and now there's some question as to the direction L Company entered Bruyeres 40 years ago. Fortuitously, Advertiser reporter Mark Matsunaga produces a photograph taken 40 years ago showing the lst Platoon entering the town, and some identifying landmarks are visible. You may have seen Francis Ohta and Lawrence Fujii walking the same route 40 years later in the local paper.

Jake Jichaku has some vivid memories of Bruyeres, especially his first night here which involved sleeping in a real bed with clean sheets yet. His wish is to find that room again, but in the intervening 40 years the original occupants have passed on, but he's still able to find the same building. What a memory!

Hope everyone who went has forgotten about the colds that everyone came down with, some so badly they gave serious thought about aborting the trip, but with everyone helping others with their favorite medications, we all managed to see it through. Now only pleasant recollections remain, including all the historical events, culture, understandings of other peoples, and of course the hospitality of the people of Bruyeres. As Lawrence Fujii said at our farewell party,

BRUYERES

Busloads of 442 and 100th veterans, spouses, relatives and friends began streaming into the huge banquet hall of this small and quaint town of La Bresse, France. We were skeptical as to whether there was a hall in this area big enough to accommodate 600 or more guests. There were twelve buses in this entourage.

With a minimum of speeches, the formal part of the program was carried out with dispatch. A highlight of the evening was the presentation of a painting done by Itsuo Tsukano to the town of Bruyeres.

Company 'I' which was housed in a newly constructed portion of the hotel in La Bresse, left at 7:30 a.m. the following day to be in time for the church service. This massive church located in a formidable site of the town was filled to capacity.

This was followed by a giant parade through town. It ended at a square in the center of town with speeches galore from dignitaries representing Bruyeres and the French government. After the program, the twelve buses proceeded toward the memorial located in the Vosges Forest. As the buses wound their way through town, scores of residents were seen waving fond goodbyes from windows, doors and sidewalks. It was a most touching scene.

A short and impressive ceremony was held at the Memorial. A World War II helmet rested like a beacon on the plaque. Immediately, we were whisked away to a convention hall to be treated to a sumptuous buffet lunch hosted by our friends from Bruyeres. The array and quantity of foods were magnificent and we consumed them with much gusto and relish.

Then, it was back to the hotel in La Bresse via the Epinal Cemetery where eleven Nisei soldiers are buried. The rows upon rows of white crosses presented an awesome sight.

START OF COMPANY 'I' TOUR

Our Company 'I' Tour led by Bruno Yamada (Central Pacific Travel) began one late evening in Honolulu with stop-overs in San Francisco, where we picked up several in our group and headed on to New York where the Los Angeles contingent joined us. JOURNEY INTO THE PAST 40TH YEAR LIBERATION OF by Fred Hirayama

After many months of anticipation and planning, our "Journey into the Past" finally got started Saturday 29th September 1984. To see what the past would reveal after 40 years, gave rise to much enthusiastic curiosity about the old battlegrounds in Europe.

Our first stop was at San Francisco, then a direct ten hour hop to London. The people from L.A. flew directly to London where we all stayed at the Hotel Forum. At this point, we grouped together to form the AA-1 and AA-2 buses of the Globus Gateway Tours, traveling together all the way thereafter. Later, it was found that more than twelve buses, including statesiders were to converge in Bruyeres during the October 19, 20 & 21 get-together for the 40th Year Liberation of Bruyeres. The AA-1 bus was comprised mostly of the 522 FA contingent with a few Kauai infantry people from an overflow of the AA-2 Kauai contingent bus, led by Tsuka Murakami. Our hardcore 522nd people who finally made this memorable trip included: from L.A.: Sadao Kodama, Jim Mizuno, m/m Roy Adachi, Sueko Nakanishi; C Btry: m/m Nelson Kato, m/m Ray Kunimura, m/m Tsuneshi Maruo, B Chapter: m/m Robert Hirata, m/m Melvyn Hamamoto, m/m Walter Inouye, m/m Lester Kato, m/m Mits Kunihiro, Hideo Nakamine, Fred Hirayama, Tadashi Matsuthis expensive past-time: jewelry, watches, shoes, moto, m/m Neil Nagareda, m/m Joe Obayashi and m/m Don Shimazu.

> With two days in London, we took on the sites of the city, ancient castles and crown jewels, and a boat ride on the Thames River. We then, headed for Dover, England on the 3rd day, where a Hovercraft awaited us to take us on a 40 minute ride to Calais, France. We then, hopped on a bus to take us to Brussels, Belgium. The 'Pissing Boy' was still there and not as bit as it was glamorized to be. A night at the Hotel Bedford and on to Amsterdam, by way of Rotterdam, which is said to be the most industrialized seaport in Europe. Eye openers in Holland would be the thousands of

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acres of reclained lowlands and the master plan for it; boat ride through the miles of canals and the Ziderzee; the largest flower distribution center in the world at Als Meer; and a visit to the Van Mopes Diamond Factory to watch craftsmen at work. Wahines for an eye on diamonds had a field day. Word got around, later, that in spite of all security precautions one lady's newly bought diamond got stolen. I can see another trip for her to this factory again, shortly.

About this time, 40th of October, many were with sniffles and coughs, taking all kinds of Tylenol, Contacs, Vicks, or what have you. It was a struggle of who could survive the sniffles. Being in an enclosed air conditioned bus didn't help. Fortunately most cases were mild and all survived.

5th of October found us going through Cologne Germany, stopping to see another of many huge Gothic Cathedrals. We passed the popularized Remagen Bridge of World War II and then went on a scenic boat ride down the Rhine river to see historic castles and sights until we got to Weisbaden, staying over at the Hotel Forum. This chic resort town boasts of a very elaborate Casimo where roulette tables and roulette slot machines are the featured games. Robert Hirata, Nelson Kato and others thought they'll get something out of this place, but no way. The "big time" section required coat and tie and a fee to enter. While the "small time" section was "as is" and no fee. We struck to small time.

On the 6th, we started down on the romantic road to Donauworth, going through quaint medieval towns that have retained their charm since the Middle Ages--noteworthy being Rothenburg--the town square coockoo clock and all.

We arrived in Danauworth in the late afternoon. The town has since developed and outgrown its size. It was difficult to remember, at first. But traces of downtown still remain, especially the old Hotel Kronen, where the 522nd CP was headquartered. It is not a hotel anymore. Many of the old buildings including the Cafes could be recognized in spite of the 40 years. The newer part of Donauworth have developed along the outskirts of the older section with the new Hotel Kronen as part of its growth, which is where we stayed over for the night and for dinner. Some of the local residents who were alerted earlier of our coming, showed up. Acquaintances of Tsuneshi Maruo still remembered him and came for the evening to reminisce old times. A pair of brother and sister and their families remembered Melvyn Hamamoto and renewed their acquaintances of 40 years ago. It was a heart warming remem-

Don Shimazu, Joe Obayashi, Hideo Nakamine and Fred Hirayama took a trip to Mertingen where HQ & B Btrys were stationed. The village has changed entirely -- the old school house is fronted with a bigger building in the front and the creamery has since been rebuilt with a bigger new factory. Still remaining is the large Gausthaus building, now Braurei-Gasthof, with the stork's nest on the chirmey roof, intact as it was. Older people we talked to still remembered the Japanese soldiers of 40 years ago.

Robert Hirata, Melvyn Hamamoto, Tadashi Matsumoto, Mits Kunihiro and Mark Matsunaga (our conscientious reporter) made a fast trip to Baumenheim where Service Btry was stationed. People remembered. Looking over the population and trying to see what happened since 40 years ago, brought out many interesting and heart warming situations. Time has passed, so we leave well enough alone. Local papers of Donauworth covered our return to "our town" well.

After only a short afternoon and evening, we left Donauworth in the morning for the infamous Concentration Camp at Dachu near Munich. Most of the structures in Dachau Camp have been renovated or newly constructed and improved with various memorabilia as a future reminder of the holocaust of the past--lest we forget. We were well covered by TV of all sorts from all over. John Tsukano worked hard to contribute much of the publicity that has come with our itinerary.

We got to Munich soon after, looking over the town and having lunch at the world famous "Hitler's Hofbrauhaus". It was food, beer and all the drinks with live musical entertainment. This huge 1000 people or more beer hall is one fantastic hideaway.

That afternoon we were hosted by the Jewish Community of Munich, the Civil Rights Group from Paris and VIPs in Germany in appreciation of our participation, fighting for the same great cause as they have always fought for. It was a memorable occasion with more TV coverage.

We moved into Konigsee Badmotel that evening and early next morning we were on the road again. It was unfortunate that we had to miss Hitler's retreat at Berchesgaden where many of us still remember the ruins.

A long four hour scenic drive down from the Bavarian and Austrian Alps took us into Venice, Italy on the 8th. It is amazing to note that Venice was man-made by Venetians during the Austrian exploitation. Although slowly sinking with

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an uneven poor land-fill, the island was finally connected by the works of Mussolini and annexed to the lands of Italy. A gondola ride through the canals of the city is a must. The Don Shimazus, Mits Kunihiros, Ray Kunimuras and Joe Obayashi all felt romantic about it and were well entertained with live music throughout their ride. A visit to the glass blowing factory and quality crystal glass ware were the noteworthy attractions in Venice.

The next day took us into Florence where leathercraft was the attraction, next to the cultural attractions of Michael Angelo, Machiaveli and other famous artists. This the Cultural city of Italy.

After staying Hotel Firenze Nova on the 9th, we headed down south to Mt Cassino where we drove up the steep mountain and visited the 100% reconstructed Abbey as it stands in magnificence over the many miles of terrain below. Its panoramic overview is inspiring.

We then headed for Sorrento, overlooking the Mediterranean, Naples Bay and City, and Mt Vesuvius from the Hotel Sorrento Palace which I thought to be the classiest with the nices design and decor the elite can afford. The reception and dancing areas were about the largest--even the Obayashis, Nakakuras and Kunihiros couldn't dance their hearts away.

The next day on the 11th, we passed Naples and Anzio, and paid our respects to those lay buried at the Sicily-Rome American Cemetery & Memorial, known to be the largest in Europe. Flowers were presented by each person to the graves, including the few 442nd men buried there.

We continued on to Rome for Hotel Agip and had dinner at the Ristorante-Mino that evening. It was women's night. The "pinching waiter" got all the women so excited that many looked forward to the "three finger pinch", considered to be the more amorous "pinching". A few ladies considered reciprocating. How was it, Jane? Ellen? Margaret? heartily greeted and thanked for coming, by the

The "Three Coins in the Fountain" in song and picture was seen with all its lights and water that night. "One coin over the left shoulder to return, two to return with spouse, and three to return with lover." Sadao Kodama was trying hard. So was Sueko Nakanishi.

The next day was a tour of the city, including the old uncovered ruins and the still being repaired Colosium. The Vatican City was a must to see. It is the greatest.

Another greatest is the Tivoli Water Fountain Gardens. It is spectacular--day or night. Dinner in the evening was full of merriment with songs, music and "pinching", at the Ristorante. Who said Lester Kato or Walter Inouye couldn't sing? Sounds of O Solo Mio certainly came from their section! Roy Adachi was trying his darndest to put away all of the Vino that kept on coming to the table!

We left Rome early Saturday morning for Livorno. We passed through familiar battle places like Civitavechia, Belvedere, Vada and Rosignano. After Nice, France we continued on to Grenoble which is considered to be one of the more modern type of city in France. The Alpotel Hotel

Each member was given few mementos by people of Bruyeres which were left on each recipient's bed. In the morning the next day we headed for Biffontaine on bus and transferred on to 2½ ton French Army trucks to drive up in the Vosges mountains area to a newly created permanent monument to commemorate it for those who died during the rescue of the "lost battalion". Jim Mizuno still remembered some of the incidents but could hardly distinguish one hill from another with so many being so much alike. The ceremony was a memorable occasion with a U.S. Army representative, French dignitaries and Veterans Organization representatives attending, plus many French people. Some of the women folks like Jane Nagareda who staved back in Bruveres renewed old acquaintances with some of the local residents. In the evening, we were hosted by the community of Bruyeres at a large banquet on the outskirts at Le Bresse. It was a festive occasion. More food, beer, wine and speeches.

The next morning on Sunday 21st a nondenominational memorial service was held at the church in Bruyeres, followed by a parade in town to the World War I and II Memorial at the Town Square for wreath placing and ceremony for the 40th year Liberation of Bruyeres. A trip to the Bruyeres 100/442 Monument in the Vosges mountains was followed with wreath placing and ceremony. After that, we also visited and paid our respects to the dead at the Epinal American Cemetery and Memorial. We later gathered in the afternoon in the newly constructed Bruyeres gymnasium for a farewell luncheon, hosted by the community of Bruyeres and to say Au Revoir.

We left Gerardmier on the 22nd and headed for Paree for a lot of city touring, two nights of fin and laughter at the Ala Bonette Franquette Club and the Cabaret Novelle. More food, wine, songs and music. The nights were fantastic. A trip to Versaille was a must to see the splendor and affluence of the French Renaisance.

We left Gay Paree and ended our stay in France on the 24th, where at Boulogne we boarded the Hovercraft to Doyer and then to London.

Our last night in London was spent at the Beef Eâters Restaurant where an eleborate King Henry VIII dinner was hosted by the European World Travel Service with all the splendor and gaiety that was typical in style and costume of the ancient era.

Leaving the Hotel Forum in London, we went on various direct flights to our own destination with the bulk arriving inHonolulu on Thursday 25th October.

What did we get out of the trip? Memories, experiences and for everyone a good dose of cold sickness. The end.

"Journey into the Past". "Sentimental Journey". Whatever we choose to call it, I'm sure most of us who journeyed to Europe on the 100/442 tour in October will remember it for a long time.

Accounts of the trip will surely be chronicled by many writers, but Kaoru Watanabe, our chapter reporter said, 'What the heck, go ahead and write something anyway''. So here I am. I will try to tell it as I saw it, without going into all the details.

First, I have to put in a plug for the Cannon-eers and their wives who went on the trip. Our bus group included Sandy Holck, our dancho-san, Yoshio and Clara Terashima from Haleiwa, Sam and Alice Yoshinari from Chicago, and Wally and Katherine Numotani from San Fracnisco. Tsuka Murakami, the fearless leader from the Garden Isle, and Yuki were busy leading another group. Tooru and May Kanazawa of New York joined us for the Biffontaine and Bruyeres programs. Sorry Curly and Arn Muraoka, Bunker Kawamoto, and Dykie Kumishige couldn't make it.

Europe, what we saw of it in 25 days (9/30-10/25) and traveling almost 5,000 miles, was a wonderment. It would be impossible in this limited space to adequately describe all that we saw the great museums, palaces, cathedrals, art works, and sculptures that graced the Old World for hundreds of years. Our whirlwind tour permitted us to see only a few of the main attractions of each of

the nine countries we visited. Never in all our lives did we go through so many different languages, many changes, continental breakfasts (ugh!) and different toilet flushes. It was a challenge, but we survived it. So in the whole process, we did manage to soak in some European history and culture.

Another reason for our tour was to revisit the areas in Italy and France where the 100/442 fought its major campaigns in 1944-45. We were not always able to pinpoint the exact areas where we were 40 years ago. There were three contributing factors for this dilemma: the elapsed 40 years have dulled our memory powers, all the mountains look alike, and we were on the main highways most of the time. But we were able to point out some general locations to our wives and other touring members for their enlighterment.

Finally, our main reason for going to Europe was the reunion with the people of Bruyeres on the 40th anniversary of the liberation of Bruyeres by the 100/442. And what a welcome we got! American flags everywhere, welcome signs on most of the store fronts, and genuine wammess and friendliness by all the townspeople. It was both a happy and emotional time. It would take too long to elaborate on all the ceremonies and events that took place in Biffontaine and Bruyeres, so I will just give a quick rundown of events in chronological order.

Sat. Oct. 20

A new monument in the mountains above Biffontaine was dedicated. This monument honored the nisei soldiers who effected the "rescue of the lost battalion". The afternoon program was a visit to the U.S. Cemetery in Epinal where another wreath laying ceremony was held. Sandy Holck did the honors for Mayor Anderson of Honolulu on both occasions. That evening the Hawaii and Mainland visitors reciprocated with a appreciation banquet for the officials of Bruyeres. It was a gala affair held in La Bresse, with over 600 in attendance.

Sun. Oct. 21

It was another busy day, starting off with a church service in the morning, followed with a parade to the town square where a ceremony was held at the French Soldiers Monument. We were then taken by bus some three miles outside of Bruyeres for another ceremony at the 442 memorial. Sandy again did the honors for Mayor Anderson. EUROPEAN TOUR - 198

We're very fortunate in having Lillian Shiraishi describe the European Tour, which included the 40th anniversary of the liberation of Bruyeres.

We joined the Co. I Europe reunion tour, leaving Sept. 30th and returning Oct. 24th, visiting England, Holland, Germany, Austria, Italy, Switzerland and France. The weather was in our favor as it started crisp and cool, then became cold in France. We enjoyed the spectacular fall foliage of fiery reds, bright yellows and orange, and the intense green of the Black Forest.

In London even the street signs were entertaining - way out (Exit), give way (Yield), areas marked 'Staff car park', office to let (Rent), etc. Visited popular "Harrods Dept. Store" where "Di" shops. Saw their fabulous sea food section where half the wall is covered with fresh fish of all sizes and stream of water filtering through the display. The show cases were filled with lobster, crab, prawns, tako, scallops etc. There were ducks, sausages, bacon hanging from the ceiling. Truly a shoppers delight. The Queen was in Canada so there was no flag at Buckingham Palace. Queen's Mum was in Scotland, salmon fishing.

There are buildings in Amsterdam still standing in water built in 1560. On some buildings the wooden foundations are giving away, so they're slanted at an angle. The water is clean, for the water ways are cleaned once a day. The pretty lace window curtains were especially attractive in each home. An average wage is around \$1100.00 a month. Social security and taxes are deducted giving everyone free medical, hospital and dental care.

Germany has 62 million inhabitants. During Hitler's regime there were 6 million unemployed, so he had them build the autoban (freeway). Their highways have no speed limits now; however, they are considering a limit to reduce air pollution. They're also under the social system like Holland where 40% of their wages go to taxes. They receive social security at age 62. Part of the Black Forest is slowly dying from pollution but nothing is being done yet. They claim 65% is from industrial pollution and 35 % from automobiles. Saw acres of cabbage planted for sauerkraut. It's a special variety, which weighs up to 40 pounds. They learned how to make sauerkraut from Japan (tsukemono) and Italians learned to make spaghetti from China.

In Italy the autobans are privately owned by family businesses or corporations, thus toll charges are required. They started to build these in

1955 and completed them in 1960. Italy grows olives, grapes, tobacco, sunflower seeds for oil, tomato etc. The olive trees take 30 years to produce and keep for hundreds of years.

Pompei is called a human tragedy, for at 79 A D its entire population of 20,000 died from poisonous gasses emitted from an eruption and buried the City under 18 to 23 feet of volcanic ash. Seventeen years before this eruption there was an earthquake to forewarn this tragedy. An excavation was started in 1748 for the ruins of Pompei. The excavation shows their living, dining quarters and public bath houses with saunas and steam rooms.

In Venice we saw the authentic venetian blinds made of sturdy wooden slats and not the plastic variety. It was astounding to see buildings built on water and standing for centuries. The gondolas go right up to a home to deliver at their front door. The intelligence of men centuries ago to build these foundations to withstand the element of time is a marvel for present day people, trying to study the components required for repair work as needed.

We took an excursion to Mt.Pilatus 7,000 feet above sea level. We crossed Lake Lucerne by steamer, then cog-wheel railway to the top and returned by 4 seater cabins of aerial cable car. It was a clear day, so we enjoyed the beautiful Swiss Alpine scenery and as far as the Black Forest Lucerne is a shoppers paradise.

Our motorcoach, seating 50 people, climbed the mountain of Sospel which was a hair raising experience, for even army trucks had great difficulty making these sharp turns over 40 years ago. Most of us took this option, for we were to stop at Monaco and its famed gambling casino. The slot machine area was open but black jack and crap tables were closed till 4:00 pm. Please ask Mike about his "luck".

To our dismay the Louvre Palace was closed on Monday so we couldn't see the famous painting with a smile. However we enjoyed shopping in Paris at the Louis Vuitton store. This store at 78 Bis Ave Marceau, is triple the size of their Ala Moana Store with about 20 salespeople, over 80 customers. We had to literally fight to get a seat to be waited on. It was worth it. We saw the Moulin Rouge show, which Stardust Hotel in Las Vegas had built to such magnitude and splendor. It was an interesting presentation.

The autoban or auto strada as their freeways are called in Europe can be converted to an air-strip for jet take off should the need arise.

Patrick Okura summarized the study in the following manner for the Pacific Citizen: 1. For most Nisei, reference to the Nikkei community becomes stronger as they get older. Nikkei involvement in politics, service groups, etc. also increases at the same time. 2. A Nikkei who grew up in the Midwest where few Japanese reside feels "at home" in the Little Tokyos on the West Coast. Nikkei retirees and widows also tend to live out their lives in the old J-towns. 3. Like the Issei, Nisei women tend to "clique" with other Nisei women as they grow older; same with the Nisei men. 4. Children are a heavy investment for the Nisei. But because Nisei have been "shut out" before, there is less demand made upon the children in terms of "oya kooko."

In a subsequent Letters section of the Pacific Citizen Hana Masuda clarifies the "Nisei Aging Project." Although her husband Dr. Minoru Masuda initiated the work, Dr. Donna Leonetti worked on the project from the beginning and carried out the entire project after Min fell ill. Hana was disappointed that no credit was given Dr. Leonetti in the previous article.

SICK CALL







Trip to Europe

Monday, September 17, 1984

The Los Angeles contingent arrived at LAX at 7:00 a.m. for the 10:00 a.m. Pan Am flight to New York. We checked in at the Mercure Porte Del Vanes Hotel and then immediately left for dinner at a typical French restaurant with music, French onion soup, cheese, etc.

Saturday, 9/22:

After breakfast, we packed and left the Hotel Mercure at 11:15 a.m. for the next stop, Belgium. A long rainy drive through the beautiful green countryside. Ray and Aki helped pass the time by leading some group singing (and, of course, Yukio and his "Lily Marlene" at every opportunity). At 3:15 p.m. we entered Belgium and the town of Antwerp, the most cosmopolitan and popular northern port. We then entered the city of Brussels and toured the old Worlds Fair grounds. Saw the Chinese and Japanese pavillions, the famous Atomium structure and the majestic palace grounds.

We then slowly cruised by the "houses" where girls sit in big bay windows -- for window shoppers. Next was a stop at a shop where beautiful lace items were handmade (or at least that's what we were told).

We turned into the heavily wooded hills towards Bruyeres and drove into the Town Square where we were warmly greeted by a welcoming committee. Some of the townspeople who greeted us were Mayor Michel Langlois, Deputy Mayor Henry Bernard, Mayor Jean Cuny of Laval, Madame Rosa Colin (affectionately known as "Mama Rosa" who during the war had a small cafe and was very kind to the 100th and 442 boys), Serge and Monique Carlesso, the president of the Friendly Relations Committee, Dr. Raymond Collin (the Mayor's assistant), Lucas and Genevieve Antonelli (he was with the U.S. Cemeteries and our interpreter) and many other wonderful and friendly citizens of Bruyeres.

We walked to a nearby restaurant where a delicious French lunch complete with wine, cheese, and blueberry pie was served. After presentation of gifts, we were all given a small wooden shoe filled with candy and appropriately inscribed made by the townspeople.

We then drove to the 442 Memorial perpetuated by the people of Bruyeres and then on to Epinal and the beautiful American Cemetery. Flowers were presented at both locations, plus at the marble crosses of several of the boys who are still buried there. It's too bad it was raining (and quite hard) so we were not able to have a graveside memorial service as planned with our own "Chaplain Bill."

I'm sure all of us will remember the hospitality and sincerity of the people of Bruyeres -- this truly was the highlight and purpose of our anniversary reunion, and to recall and remember the experiences and buddies of 40 years ago. I do think that some of the fellows still expected to see a familiar farmhouse or landmark (after 40 years?) but did recognize some of the mountains where they were "stationed."

Couldn't get over some of the street names in Bruyeres -- such as 442 Street and Honolulu Avenue. This truly was a wonderful day for all of us.

After a long downhill ride through wooded mountains, we arrived at Colmar and checked into the Terminus Bristol Hotel about 8:00 p.m. This was a most elegant hotel with crystal chandeliers, flowers everywhere, thick rugs and other elaborate furnishings.

Wednesday, 9/26;

Left Colmar at 8:00 a.m. for Switzerland. This ride was every bit as beautiful as picture postcards with its high snow capped mountains and deep green valleys. Pulled into Lucerne and the first stop was the Lion Monument. Then we stopped in the middle of the city where some immediately began shopping at Bucherers while others went for the ride up the Mount Pilatus. After a 7,000 foot cogwheel train ride (straight up!) we were able to see the snow capped Alps for miles around. During lunch at the top it clouded up and then began to snow -- what a beautiful breathtaking spectacular panoramic sight as we descended on the cable cars (closest thing to heaven that many will experience). Back down to the city again and a walk through the old wooden bridge on Lake Lucerne -- where many of the boys remembered seeing on their one week Swiss R & R from Italy.


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
