Service Company Spotlight Jimmy Miyake, Educator and Humanitarian

Service Chapter is proud of their many successful veterans. One of them is JIMMY MIYAKE, the wizard from Koloa, Kauai, who now resides in Aina Haina, Oahu, with his lovely wife, MARTHA.

The MIYAKE family has been a legend in the 442nd Regiment - four brothers volunteered for the unit: JIMMY with Service Chapter, PAUL

with Cannon Chapter, EDDIE (deceased) with "M" Chapter and WALTER with the 522nd Artillery Battalion plus UNCLE MUTT of Service Chapter and three cousins.

In Service Chapter, JIMMY worked in the Regimental Supply Office with his good buddies, RALPH CHINAKA and KOJI AKIMOTO (deceased). Although he faced several close calls at the battlefront, JIMMY returned home safe and sound and was discharged from the service in December 1945.

Shortly thereafter, JIMMY didn't wasted any time and married MARTHA NITTA. He earned his Bachelors Degree in 1949 and his Master in Education in 1950 from Springfield College in Massachusetts. They returned to Hawaii in time for their son's birth on July 25, 1950.

In the fall of 1950, JIMMY accepted a position at University of Hawaii (UH) in the Student Counseling Center and was subsequently promoted to Assistant Professor of Sociology and Foreign Students Advisor. In 1955, he received the Certificate of Pacific and Asian Affairs Council Award for his outstanding work with foreign students.

In 1959, JIMMY was selected for a U.S. State Department position as the Executive Director of the U.S. Educational Commission in Bangkok, Thailand (the Fulbright Commission). JIMMY did such an outstanding job, in 1967, he received the rare and prestigious "Order of the White Elephant" decoration and scroll from the King of Thailand. This award is comparable to the Order of the Rising Sun Award given by the Japanese government.

After serving in Thailand for eight years, he returned to Hawaii in 1967. He was appointed by Governor John A. Burns to establish a program for economic development between Hawaii and Southeast Asian countries. This program was later called the Hawaii International and Service Agency (HISA) in the Dept. of Planning and Economic Development.

In 1968, JIMMY was appointed Education and Cultural Affairs Officer for the U.S. Dept. of State. In 1970, he relocated to the Department of Education and assigned to the Office of Li-

brary Services in charge of the Capital Improvement Program for the Libraries until his retirement in December 1983.

Since then, JIMMY has become actively involved with the 442 Mother Club activities. He is now serving as 2nd Vice President of the 442, and also has been an advisor to the 442 Sons and Daughter's Chapter for the past two years, and also belongs to the Tuesday Ukulele Club.

JIMMY and MARTHA are proud of their two children, son, GARRETT and daughter, CHRISTINE (JONES), and the apple of their eye, 5-year old granddaughter, JESSICA JONES. JIMMY'S favorite "job" is being best friend to JESSICA. JIMMY SAN: "Yoku Yarimashita. Gokuro sama deshita."

Legacy Foundation Exhibit

I was on my third can of Coors light beer when I received a call from my fellow chapter member, OSCAR MIYASHIRO, on Mother's Day (May 8th). OSCAR, very excitedly explained that he and his family attended the official opening day ceremony of the Legacy Foundation exhibit entitled, "Unlikely Liberators" at the Kapiolani Community College Library on May 7th.

She explained the exhibit is dedicated to the 813 AJA's killed in combat in WWII and to the memories of the late SENATOR SPARKY MATSUNAGA and to the late MR. MIKE MASAOKA.

My wife and I visited the exhibit on May 11 based on ANN's suggestion and true to her words, it was really a once in a lifetime experi-

ence. The exhibit highlighted the events of the 522nd Artillery Liberation of the Jewish people in the death camp of Dachau. The 90 photographs used in the exhibit were all enlarged and very clear and candid. The 522nd opened the gates to Dachau which was the home of 32,000 prisoners from 27 countries.

Yes, as ANN said, "It was a stirring and moving experience to watch the collection of photographs which constituted an extremely important piece of American and European histories." I, too, was overcome with emotion. "Namida ga demashita."

The exhibit will be open until June 30, 1994. I recommend all 442nd Vets visit the exhibit to honor our fallen comrades. I also suggest we give our 100% support to all our Sons & Daughters club activities. They can use our support.

Quarters 1 and 2, 1994

In the years of reporting EASY's chapter activities for the 442nd Newsletter, this writer missed

his first deadline by a week-so apologies. It's probably time what we get a new writer who won't miss deadlines. As a consequence EASY readers will have to wait a quarter, the second in 12 months, to read about their activities as the reports of the first two quarters are combined in one. So the report begins with an event in December.

Including this writer ten EASY members turned out to place Christmas poinsettias at the gravestones of our 16 comrades who were killed in war and another 22 who dies following the war. Several others who died since the war are buried at private cemeteries on Oahu including one ROKURO IMAOKA whose remains were disinterred and reinterned elsewhere. The whole exercise took only about thirty minutes as four groups spread out to place the poinsettia pots at the headstones of our fallen comrades. Several dozen red gingers were donated by LARRY IWAHASHI and these were placed at the headstones in receptacles already there or placed nearby. It was the original plan to place red gingers in two and a half tall cans but last minute calls made the poinsettias available.

The hurry up and wait training of the U.S. Army certainly has had a strong impact on veterans as everyone but one was ready at Punchbowl at 9:15 for a 9:30 start. Those already there on the writers arrival at 9:15 were TADAO YOSHIMOTO, SHIGERU TOM OOKA, DON MASUDA, TOMO UYEDA, MASAMI DOI, GEORGE TANDO, EDWIN GOYA, L.A. native, TOK SHIOMICHI, whose wife is a local girl, who were home for the holidays and this writer. WAICHI TAKEMOTO was the only one not there at my arrival but he showed up a few minutes later.. He lives in Mililani. This group has at least three men, TOMO UYEDA and TADAO YOSHIMOTO, who know the burial plots of two thirds of the plots and that makes placing the poinsettias very simple. This writer wishes to express his and the chapter's gratitude for the splendid support for the project.

HARRY TACHIBANA was at the chapter's last meeting looking chipper and healthy as ever. HARRY experienced some health problems that has placed him in limbo for awhile but he seems and looks like a new man. LOUISE IWAHASHI fell in December and broke her hips.

LAWSEN SAKAI and his fellow "EASY" Northern Californians have packaged a very attractive Mediterranean cruise plus a visit to Bruyeres where they will receive a heroes welcome with a parade through town and to the memorial to the 442nd RCT in the woods. The tour also will include a visit to Biffontaine. PIERRE MOULIN who has a special relationship with EASY COM-PANY through LAWSEN SAKAI promises that EASY visitors will have a memorable visit. The trip is labeled a mini reunion for EASY company veterans and has an extensive list of participants from California, Hawaii and other cities on the mainland. U.S. SENATOR DANIEL & MAGGIE INOUYE are expected to be there. KATHY CROWLEY, TOM CROWLEY'S widow, will also be there. There is still room for anyone wishing to make the tour. At his writing (late May) this may not be possible. Following Bruyeres the group will visit Paris as well as the beaches of northern France where the Allied forces made their invasion landings in June, 1943. The tour of Bruyeres certainly looks like a tour that will bring back some vivid memories of our battles of fifty years ago.

He was followed by a trio of one spouse and two children of the 442nd whose combines message was the Keynote Dialogue "TALK TO ME, DAD". As stated earlier the future of the 442nd Veterans Club is in good hands. The sansei and yonsei will do a better job than their seniors about carrying the torch of the 442nd RCT into the future.

Earlier that day the Sons and Daughters also organized and directed the Anniversary Memorial Service at Punchbowl. As with anniversary dinner, the Memorial Program was conducted with dignity and solemnity befitting the enormous contributions and lasting sacrifices made by those buried at Punchbowl. Keynote speaker was Dr. Kenneth P. MORTIMER, president of the University of Hawaii who reminded the gathering that we must speak up against movements like that which brought about WWII if we are to survive as civilized peoples. He also stated that in order for the generations to follow we, of this generation, leave an accounting of the trials and tribulations that brought us here where we are today. And this means that we need to do the kind of things the Sons and Daughters are now involved; i.e., giving of ourselves to providing oral histories so that our Sons and Daughters could put together several volumes of what made the men of 442nd do what they did.

As a take-off from the ideas presented by

SONS & DAUGHTERS and the President of the University of Hawaii, EASY Chapter invited JUDY WEIGHTMAN as guest speaker at the May 12 dinner meeting at the Flamingo Chuckwagon restaurant. At a previous dinner meeting the women of the club raised questions about the role their husbands played in the war and were anxious to learn more about the war.

JUDY WEIGHTMAN is an attorney and staff member of the WILLIAM RICHARDSON School of Law at the University of Hawaii. She also was the prime mover in the project that culminated in the video presentation of the involvement of the 522nd Field Artillery Battalion of the 442nd RCT in the liberation of Jews from Dachau prison. In her presentation JUDY spoke about how they went about developing the bases for the video production. It was actually a series of oral history video tapings of the experiences of the men of the 522nd Battalion and the eventual production of the final product.

Besides the video tape they also completed a transcription of the tapes into a two volume oral history record for library purposes. These two volumes include the questions and answers of the oral history interviews and should serve EASY chapter well in its desire to do an oral history project on its own. JUDY referred EASY to the Mother Club as a source of the two volumes from which the questions asked could be lifted so that the blind need not lead the blind. The project is going to be a Herculean task and will sorely test the Chapter's will to undertake something not only for the spouses but for the sake of the children of the chapter.
