On Monday, May 22, 1994, several 522nd members met with NANCY ARAKI of the Japanese American National Museum of Los Angeles to discuss our reunion scheduled for april 27, 1995 in Los Angeles. Nancy stated that one of the highlights of the reunion will be the "522 FA Bn story" which will be on exhibit at the museum to coincide with our reunion. The purpose of this meeting was to discuss the format and contents of the exhibit. It was generally agreed that the exhibit should include photos, documents, artifacts, newspaper clippings, etc., to specifically highlight the unique role of the 522 FA Bn in such activities as the Dachau liberation.

TED stated that there is considerable discussion currently on-going among the 42nd and 45th Division and the 522 FA Bn as to the role each organization played in the "Dachau Liberation". We are fortunate because our exhibit will precede a general exhibit of the Nisei soldiers in WWII, which will be shown at the museum in the summer of 1995. Again, all you Charleys, please resurrect your old photo albums from your mothballed chest and let us all contribute our photos and anecdotes to make the "522 story" an outstanding and interesting exhibit for all.

Although the Japanese American National Museum is dedicated to the story of the Japanese Americans in America, the museum is open to the general public and is widely seen by all segments of society. MANABI HIRASAKI is one of the trustees of the museum so let us all support him and make the exhibit a success. All you neighbor islanders partifularly NIGALIT FUJIMOTO, TSUKA ISHII, SAM MORIKAWA and OLD MAN SHIMAOKA, you are welcome to contribute. You are not forgotten.
