If he's still around, I would like to see if he could make the trip to France and join us in the last "hurrah."

HARRY ABE and I attended an ad-hoc meeting in San Francisco in February for the Go For Broke National Veteran's Association. So we took this opportunity to visit FRANK YANO. He looks good, retired from the Postal Service and living life comfortably as any retiree should. I had not seen him since the day before we were captured, almost 50 years ago. The three of us talked for nearly two hours. It was good seeing him again."

WILLIE YASUTAKE had this to say: "You probably heard from JIMMIE KANAYA that he is planning to go to Bruyeres impendently. HARRY ABE and I have decided to go with the group that is leaving from L.A. It is organized by RUDY TOKIWA (Sunnydale, CA) through the S.I.E.L Voyages Agency (PIERRE MOULIN is the coordinator for the agency). Our paths may not cross during our tours, but I hope we will be able to get together at the reunion. I see that your group will be staying in Colmar which appears to be 25+miles east of Bruyeres on the map. We will be in Hotel Ibis in Epinal - which is approximately 15 miles west of Bruyeres.

HARRY is planning to fly directly to Rome from NY and will join us in Rome. I will fly into Chicago from Seattle and join the group there. I'm really looking forward to the trip. I'm planning to do lot of reading to jar my gray matter - will tale a lot of jarring, I'm afraid.

We were in Anaheim during the middle of April. Like kids we did the various rides at Disneyland. We dared ride that Matterhorn but is almost scared the life out of us.

KAY KANESHIMA cam down from L.A. to treat us to Sunday brunch at the Anaheim Marriot Hotel. We spent the whole morning with KAY and her family - daughter JOCELYN and husband RON KAWASAKi and son SPENCER and

daughter NINA and husband LESTER TANAKA and son TYLER. RON is with the Postal Service and LESTER is a graphic artist. Needless to say, KAY is fully occupied with the two baby grandsons.

I finally got to see brother MIKE and his wife MARGARET in Redondo Beach. The last time I saw them on the mainland was in 1955 at Fort Wayne, Indiana where he was studying engineering.
