

The Sun Press ran her story as "JANE DOE" who learned accidentally that the man she called "Dad" wasn't her real father. The only thing she knew about her biological father was his name and where he went to school. Her mother was ELIZABETH ONO.

I was aware that we have a Cannoneer, STEVE

KANESHIRO living on the Mainland, but didn't connect the two facts.

Then the November 1994 issue carried the happy ending to that search by "JANE DOE." Accompanying the article on the front page was an overseas photo of STEVE KANESHIRO flanked by JOHN USHIJIMA and TETSUO HAMADA (KIA). "JANE DOE" found her biological father in California and his family and relatives have accepted her into their families.

World War II separated STEVEN from then pregnant ELIZABETH. When STEVEN left for Europe with Cannon Company, she asked STEVEN not to make contact because she wanted her child to give complete loyalty to the man who would someday marry her and be a father to her child. What a poignant story with a happy ending!

And more Cannoneer related story from the news. The February 3,1995 issue of the Hawaii Herald carried a front page story of the 100th Battalion veteran PAUL SAKAMOTO and AMERICO BUGLIANI who were reunited in Hilo 50 years after their first meeting in Valdicastello, Italy.

In July 1994, at the 47th reunion of the 34th "Red Bull" Division in Chicago, the men of the 34th turned the spotlight on the Nisei of the 100th and the 442nd. In that ceremony, the 34th Division Association honored the Nisei with a proclamation presented to the Chicago Nisei Post. Receiving the proclamation was Cannoneer SAM YOSHINARI as the Commandant of the Chicago Nisei Post. SAM earned a battle-field commission as a 1st Lt. I was a member of the Second Platoon so you may detect a bit of pride showing.

The Chicago Nisei Post felt that this proclamation rightfully belonged in Honolulu because that's where the 100th and consequently the 442nd really started. So BUGLIANI, a member of Chicago Nisei Post - a membership directly resulting from his never-forgotten memory of a Nisei soldier whose fleeting act of generosity and kindness in giving a 12-year old Italian lad in Valdicastello some candy, C-rations, and his woolen cap - offered to hand deliver the procla-

mation on his trip to Hawaii to search for that Nisei soldier, PAUL SAKAMOTO.

The reception at the 100th Battalion Clubhouse to receive the proclamation was attended by Cannon Chapter President, MASARU KOIKE and Treasurer HENRY CHAGAMI. There is a whole lot more to this very moving story about AMERICO BUGLIANI leading up to his trip to Hawaii in search for PAUL SAKAMOTO.
