Masi Okumura's Memoirs (cont'd)

My vivid remembrance of the Battle of Bruyeres begins in a copse of woods just before a rolling valley within sight of the town. We had been in reserve and now we're called upon to take Bruyeres in a frontal attack. Some 36th Division guys were dug in with machine guns, 50 ca., and we dug in amongst them. Lt. Smith had to go to company hdqtrs for orders so we all waited. When he came back, he told me to call all the squad leaders and gave them the orders. "L" Co to lead the 3rd Battalion. 2nd Pltn to lead the company. The artillery was to land smoke in the valley and when it lifted we were to advance. The artillery barrage began and the smoke started to land. Smitty said, "let's go men," and to my amazement started out of the woods with his carbine in his hand and no scouts out! Being his runner, I had to go Kawamura; Paul Matsumoto; Toshi Nakahata; Elxan

In the Italian campaign, it was his custom to have a squad and scouts in front, then we came, the platoon CP with the platoon sgt himself and his runner, namely myself. So I was rather non plussed (scared shitless) when he strode in front alone and me behind him with mincing steps. We were about two hundred yards out when the smoke lifted and the shell started to land amongst us. Evidently, it was our own shells, short rounds! The Germans spotted us and we were pinned down with small arm fires, rifle and burp guns and artillery fire. We were ordered back to the copse of trees and regrouped. I think a couple of guys were hit but none seriously.

Later, we took the road into town and we were the first troops in Bruyeres. We had to go house to house to clear them of the enemy and when we reached a bend in the road, we could see the German marching orderly out the other end of town. By that time other elements of the regiment had entered from other streets and we had secured the town. I remember that we slept in a house that we were told later was the Mayors. The bed I slept in had silken sheets and I went to sleep with my boots on! After Bruyeres, the other battalions had taken all four hills surrounding the town, Hills A, B, C and D, and had moved on to other objectives. Later on we found out that the Germans had reoccupied Hill D and F Co. was ordered to retake it with a platoon from H Co., and 2nd platoon of L Co. F Co. made the frontal attack which they later called "Banzai Hill." I never saw H Co., but we were placed in ambush position on the reverse side of the hill. As F Co made their charge, we caught the Germans in retreat, coming down the hill in full flight. It was like knocking down pins in a bowling alley! I saw the men firing from behind trees with Tommy Guns and rifles and throwing grenades and just decimating the enemy. Just at that critical time, Smitty told me to tell the men to fix bayonets! As I ran around relaying the order, I could tell that it was just about over. As he yelled "charge," a potato grenade landed between he and I. He got it right in the ass, so we desisted. It was all over anyhow and were hollering, "Kamerade, Kamerade." That means I Surrender! They were all kids, 14 to 17 years old and crying out loud. Richard Koto told me 51 years later that they were Polacks, forced into the German army.

We regrouped and got out of there with Smitty leading and I right behind him. Frank Miyauchi was

right behind me and as we were walking along the trail in the forest, he stepped on a Schuh mine and injured his leg. I escaped injury but the grenade hit Lt. Smith. I lived a charmed life during all four battles, escaping by a frogs hair many times! (To be continued)
