AGING TASK FORCE AWARDED CONTRACT

Announcement was made in Washington, through the Office of Administration on Aging that the AAMHRC's proposal, under the direction of Dr. Sharon Fujii, has been granted the full amount of \$231,354 for the next 18 months.

KOREAN COMMUNITY IN LOS ANGELES AND THE NEW FRONTIER SPIRIT

With the initial seed money grant from the California State Health Department, the Task Force on Korean Community Mental Health was able to launch a demonstration program to deliver mental health services to new immigrants in the Los Angeles area. The Advisory Board has recently appointed Dr. Hwasoo Lee as its Director. Mr. Duck Soo Hahn is the Task Force Coordinator.



SAMOAN COMMUNITY LAUNCHES A SELF STUDY ON COMMUNITY NEEDS

After a few months of preparation and community meetings, the Samoan community, under the direction of Palafu Tili, Board member of AAMHRC, and Amani Magalei, of the Oriental Service Center and one of the very few social workers from the Samoan community, has begun a large scale survey research to assess various aspects of the health and mental health needs of the community. Twenty-six interviewers capable of speaking the Samoan language are organized and the field work is supervised by two Samoan college students, with the assistance of Ramsay Shu, Research Assistant of AAMHRC. The field work is expected to be concluded toward the end of August.

RURAL ASIANS AND THEIR PROBLEMS

Even though the majority of the Asian population in the United States is urban, we still have many rural kinfolk working on the farms in the Central Valley of California which extends from north of Stockton to the Imperial Valley in the southern part of California. Rural Asians include the Japanese, the Pilipino, the Chinese, the Indian, The Korean, and more recently, some Vietnamese and Cambodians. The Rural Asian Caucus of the northern California Regional Committee initiated the comprehensive study of the quality of life among rural Asians with particular emphasis on the elderly. Jose Bernardo, after having recently lost, and quite narrowly, in the County Supervisors election in the Primary Election, is able to devote more of his time to his family and the interests of the Rural Asians. The AAMHRC is honored to have the opportunity to serve in a consulting capacity on this project. Mr. Neil Tashima, a Research Assistant of AAMHRC, is coordinating the field work efforts in various rural communities in the Central Valley.

ECONOMIC TASK FORCE FORMED

Dr. Yuen-li Wu, Task Force Chair on the Economic conditions of Asian Americans, has invited the following people to serve on the Task Force: Prof. Roberto Mariano (Dept. of Economics, University of Pennsylvania), Prof. Izumi Taniguchi (Dept. of Economics, California State University at Fresno), Prof. Nguyn-Tien Hung (Dept. of Economics, Howard University), Prof. Joseph Chung (Dept. of Economics, Illinois Institute of Technology), Prof. Ching-wen Kwang (Business & Economics, Cal. State University at Hayward)

Unlike the Aging and Elderly Task Force, which convened a series of meetings to include service delivery people and researchers to identify problems and issues, the Economic Task Force, because of the nature of its problems, takes the form of having experts to come up with a number of position papers on the economic conditions of various sub-ethnic populations among the Asian Americans: the Chinese, the Vietnamese, Japanese, Pilipinos, Koreans, etc. These position papers will serve as background papers so that the labor participation and economic discrimination against the Asians can be clearly identified. The Task Force will also recommend future research efforts.



ASIAN AMERICAN PSYCHOLOGISTS DISCUSS FUTURE TRAINING OF PSYCHOLOGISTS

Under a grant from the National Institute of Mental Health, Stanley Sue and Robert Chin convened a meeting of Asian Psychologists on the campus of California State University at Long Beach. The meeting was hosted by Dr. Albert Yee, Dean of the Graduate Studies at CSULB, and himself a well known psychologist. The three day meeting covered some of the fundamental problems concerning close ties between academic training of professional psychologists and services rendered to the communities.
