A REPORT FROM THE INVESTIGATION COMMITTEE

The Investigation Committee has formulated and set up the following projects:

- 1) information pertaining to the ethnic breakdown of New York City; population statistics, housing, employment rates, education, economic status, etc. of Asian Americans living in New York City.
- 2) research into expanding membership; means of politicizing non-political people.
- 3) Chinatown: development, problems, characteristics.

 Japanese Community: where? characteristics, etc.
- 4) establishment of communications with other Asian alliances in the U.S.
- 5) research into the implications of the McCarran Act and the Eastland Bill.

Although materials are still being gathered for further research and distribution, our efforts thus far have progressed as follows:

1) 27 letters have now been sent out to k various agencies, information centers, etc. in New York City requesting information concerning the ethnic breakdown of the city, etc.

Research has also been done in regard to the 1960 Population Census of Non-White Population by Race.

2) It has been approved by the general assembly to print up informational-greeting cards (in both English and Chinese) containing the statement of purpose and our P.O.Box number for distribution to Asians at rallies, demonstrations, conferences, etc.

The newsletter will also be utilized as a vehicle for expanding membership.

3) A group of Chinese students at Columbia University has undertaken a study of conditions in the Chinatown area. Covering such areas as living conditions, economic status, community involvement, and family structure, the results of the study will be published and available towards the end of June.

Contacts are also being set up with people in the Chinatown community.

4) Correspondence has been established with people in the Asian American Political Alliance (Berkeley chapter).

It was also approved by the group to subscribe to GIDRA ab and the AAPA newspaper to be used as sources of information, news, and possible research materials.

5) Article has been written (in the newsletter) pertaining to the km McCarran Act and the Eastland Bill.

Letters have also been written to various Senators actively involved with the repeal of the McCarran Act.
